# HAVE YOU ACCESSED «UKRAINIAN WWW LINKS» ON THE INTERNET?

Introduced by a Ukrainian tryzub symbol, a page on the INTERNET is providing a vast supernet-link for Ukrainians surfing on the net.

The Toronto-based World Wide Web (WWW) site contains a broad range of links, or connections, between Ukrainian INTERNET sites across the world. In fact, according to its creator, doctoral student Yaroslav Vasyly Kokodyniak at the University of Toronto, the site lists connections to every Ukrainian site to which he comes across. Its URL is:

As of mid-October, this site provided a catalogue of an extensive panorama of Ukrainian services. The sites are indexed by country/geographical locations, by hot list of sites, by Ukrainian INTERNET News Groups and Ukrainian sites containing Ukrainian KOI-8 font standard.

The Toronto site points users to locations in many countries, including **Canada (121 links!!!), U.S. (369 links), Australia (7 links), Israel (9 links), Austria (51 links), France (8 links), Germany (2 links), Italy (5 links), Latvia (10 links), Netherlands (2 links), Poland (1 link), Russia (6 links), U.K. (10 links) and, of course, Ukraine (331 links).**

The KOI-8 Font standard is one of several standards available for the displaying of Cyrillic text. Others include the CP1251, Apple Standard Cyrillic, ISO8859-5, and CP866/AV. The KOI-8 standard appears to be the most dominant one on the INTERNET News Groups and on World Wide Web pages. The site contains information on font installation and access to Microsoft Windows fonts, and other fonts and drivers.
