## INFORMATION: THE CURRENCY OF DEMOCRACY

## COMMUNICATIONS TRAINING WORKSHOPS IN LVIV, EDMONTON

t has been said that information is the currency of democracy. Just as the free-flow of a monetary currency fuels economic activity, it is the free-flow or passing of information between the public and the government that fuels democratic activity.

In September the West Ukrainian Resource Centre (WURC) for non-government organizations held its first 'NGO Public Communication Training Workshop" in the Karpatia Hotel in Lviv to explore new opportunities for fuelling public information and discussion in Ukrainian society.

The workshop, sponsored by Partners in Civil Society Program, was delivered by InfoPak Communications of Winnipeg. It was designed to acquaint Resource Centre staff, NGO members and advocacy organization volunteers with the various elements of public awareness needed to effectively communicate with governments, other organizations, benefactors and the general Among the participants were the International Renaissance Foundation, Democratic Initiatives Foundation, Plast Ukraine, Economics and Politics Regional Foundation, Law for Ukraine Foundation, Lion Society, Regional Centre for Ecological Cooperation, Ukraine-Europe Regional Foundation and Counterpart Foundation.

## Lviv Workshop Goals and **Objectives**

Each of the four days of the workshop was presented as a distinct module. The sessions addressed such topics as information requirements, available media resources, network communication strategies and specific techniques for partnership building, public awareness, fundraising, government advocacy and public policy lobbying. The workshop also provided Centre members with basic communication skill training in writing, design and production, as well as a teaching guide needed to pass that knowledge on to others involved in social advocacy issues.

Workshop exercises focused on developing partnership strategies for such hypothetical issues as a public awareness campaign to encourage volunteer support in organizations; small business lobbying for improved taxation and reduced regulation; an anti-drinking and alcohol abuse campaign focused at teenagers; an AIDS and STD public awareness campaign; and an advocacy initiative to lobby government for tax benefits for benefactors and funding supporters.

The workshop provided volunteer personnel with an appreciation of various audiences, an understanding of the communications process and the use of communication planning



techniques, tools and resources. It assisted the Centre in developing its internal capacity to plan, manage and implement public communication activities, as well as providing the capability and training resources needed to prepare other NGO's in effective communications.

Final copies of the NGO Communications Training Manual and Public Relations Guide are

available at both the Canada-Ukraine Partnership Program (CUPP) Office in Kyiv and in the resource library of the WURC in Lviv. Other NGOs and community organizations are encouraged to use the Guide, either independently or as a training resource, in preparing their own staff and volunteers for improved dialogue with government and the public.

Both organizations from Ukraine want to develop into fullyoperational umbrella NGO's providing support services to various other nongovernment organizations in Ukraine.

A total of five Ukrainian non-government organizations (NGOs) are participating in this CIDA-funded program designed to strengthen Ukraine's non-profit and voluntary sectors: Western Ukraine Resource Centre, Kharkiv Centre for Gender Studies, Democratic Initiatives Foundation, Lviv
